Another excellent school week has come to an end. This week, I want to discuss classroom management. In what ways does good classroom management contribute to student success? Effective classroom management refers to keeping students organized, orderly, focused, attentive, on task, and academically productive.

Three examples of effective classroom management are: (1) Establish and follow guidelines. A teacher's classroom rules are unique to each class, but teachers who are consistent with their rules manage their classrooms best. (2) Be as engaging as possible with your class. (3) Encourage parents to get involved early.





The Fundamental 5

are the five critical practices that are at the core of highly effective instruction.





Framing the Lesson:

- Simply means the teacher gives the student a clear picture of...
 - What will be happening today and...
 - What they will be able to do with the knowledge
 - It goes back to clear expectations: What are you doing, why are you doing it...
 - Represents the **beginning** and **end** of the lesson
 - Objectives should be written in concrete, student friendly language
 - Communicates a clear focus to the student and teacher

<u>Power Zone</u>:

- Simply teaching or monitoring in close proximity to one student, or a small group of students, or the entire classroom full of students.
- Basically you are wherever the students are
 - On task behaviors increase
 - Discipline issues decrease
 - Student retention of the content increases

Frequent Small Group Purposeful Talk:

- After every 10-15 minutes of teacher driven discussion, or at the completion of a major instructional concept (whichever comes first) the teacher briefly stops talking and has groups of 2-4 students briefly discuss a **seed question** related to the instruction or instructional activity.
- It is not a long conversation or an unstructured one
- It is a focused microdiscussion lasting between 30 seconds and 3 minutes

Recognize and Reinforce:

- Nine tenths of education is encouragement
- I know you will do it, I'm proud of you, good, keep going, well done, you can do it, fantastic effort, great work, you are smart
- Make a big deal of the small things
- Start reinforcing the work it takes to be successful

Critical Write:

- Writing for the purpose of organizing, clarifying, defending, refuting, analyzing, dissecting, connecting, and/or expending on ideas or concepts.
- Most natural and authentic way to increase the rigor
- It's not copying from a book. Neither is it a fill in the blank activity or free writing.
- It can consist of: a simple list, a short comparison paragraph, a quick summary, a mind map, purposeful note taking, a written exit ticket, a formal essay or term paper

Fundamental 5 Focus of the Week

Frequent, Small-Group, Purposeful Talk:

After every 10 to 12 minutes of teacher-driven discussion, or at the completion of a major instructional concept (which ever comes first), the teacher briefly stops talking and has groups of 2 to 4 students (hence the term small group) briefly discuss a seed question related to the instruction or the instructional activity.

- Keep in mind that this is not a long conversation, nor is it an unstuctured one.
- It is a focused discussion lasting between 30 seconds to 3 minutes.
- The structure for this fundamental 5 practice is provided by the teacher in four ways:
 - Frequency
 - Group Size
 - Seed Question
 - Power Zone



Instructional Strategy Focus for the Week

Think-Pair-Share:

- Helps students to think individually about a topic or answer to a question.
- Teaches students to share ideas with classmates and builds oral communication skills.
- Helps focus attention and engage students in comprehending the reading material.

How to Use Think-Pair-Share:

- Decide upon the text to be read and develop the set of questions or prompts that target key content concepts.
- Describe the purpose of the strategy and provide guidelines for discussions.
- Model the procedure to ensure that students understand how to use the strategy.
- Monitor and support students as they work through the following:

TPS

- T: (Think) Teachers begin by asking a specific question about the text.
 Students "think" about what they know or have learned about the topic.
- P: (Pair) Each student should be paired with another student or a small group.
- S: (Share) Students share their thinking with their partner. Teachers
 expand the "share" into a whole-class discussion.





Ms. Taylor's Biology class performing microscope labs with animal and plant cells











Our intro to Cosmetology Class is studying infection control, and has now learned the art of taking off gloves the proper way.
